MINUTES

**Davie County - Board of Commissioners
Regular Session**

1. Meeting Called to Order - Chair Finney

Chair Finney called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM.

Cameron Webb went over the emergency exits.

Chair Finney thanked the Board of Education, Dr. Belcher, and Clay Harris for allowing us to use the facilities.

Chair Finney reminded everyone that this is a business meeting and the meeting rules will apply,, which can lead to dismissal if needed.

2. Invocation - Chair Finney

Chair Finney gave the invocation.

3. Pledge of Allegiance - DCSO Honor Guard

4. Ethics & Conflicts Disclosure - County Attorney, Ed Vogler

County Attorney Ed Vogler stated: "Pursuant to NCGS 160A-86 and the Davie County Board of Commissioners Code of Ethics adopted December 2, 2019, I would ask each of you before you adopt the agenda if there is any actual, potential or perceived conflicts of interest with respect to any matter on the proposed agenda which will come before the Board for a vote at this meeting today. If so, please speak up and let the Board know at this time before the agenda is adopted." No Commissioner spoke. Vogler then stated, "It is therefore concluded that there are no actual, potential, or perceived conflicts of interest by any Board member."

5. Adopt Agenda - Chair Finney

Commissioner Jones made the motion to adopt the agenda. Commissioner Shoaf seconded the motion. All were in favor, and the motion passed 5-0 (Jones, Finney, Poindexter, Renegar, Shoaf)

6. Public Comment Period - County Attorney, Ed Vogler

a. Public Comment Period Rules

Chair Finney opened the Public Comment period and explained that individuals wishing to speak on matters other than the proposed data center moratorium would be recognized during Public Comment. Individuals wishing to speak on the proposed moratorium were given the option to defer their comments until the Public Hearing.

Mr. Bill Vaughn addressed the Board regarding the need for a County Engineer position. He expressed concern that the position had not been funded in the recent budget process and stated that a County Engineer would provide valuable technical expertise in infrastructure, stormwater, transportation, development review, and engineering projects throughout the County.

No additional speakers addressed the Board during the Public Comment period.

7. Public Hearing - Brian Barnett

a. Public Hearing Comment Rules

b. Ordinance of the Davie County Board of Commissioners Imposing a One-Year Moratorium on the Development of Data Centers in Davie County, North Carolina

County Manager Brian Barnett presented the statutory authority for and purpose of the proposed data center moratorium. He explained that the proposed 12-month moratorium would provide the County time to study the potential impacts of data center development, develop appropriate zoning regulations, and conduct three public hearings throughout the review process. Mr. Barnett stated that neither Davie County staff nor the Board of Commissioners had entered into any non-disclosure agreements with data center developers. While county staff have been approached by companies seeking information regarding zoning regulations and utility availability, no formal applications for a data center have been submitted. He further explained that the County's current zoning ordinance does not define a data center, making the moratorium necessary to allow time to establish a clear definition and appropriate land use regulations. Mr. Barnett also noted that developers typically meet with utility and development services staff during the preliminary stages of evaluating a potential project before submitting a formal application.

The public hearing opened at 6:33 PM regarding the proposed one-year moratorium on data center development within the County's zoning jurisdiction.

We will start with the 8 individuals who signed up for public comment.

Chair Finney asked if anyone was against the moratorium to raise their hand; no one did so.

County Attorney Ed Vogler reviewed the rules governing the public hearing and reminded speakers to limit comments to the proposed moratorium and maintain appropriate decorum.

Linda Mace spoke regarding the potential impact of data centers on utility bills. She stated that

she had researched the issue and believes the revenue generated would not provide a significant benefit to the County.

Ralph Graves passed on speaking.

Joann Landry (27006) requested that the County stop any consideration of data centers.

Breanna Tilley stated that she hopes the community will stand together to keep data centers out of Davie County.

Misty Hall expressed concerns regarding the impact of artificial intelligence on jobs. She stated that she has conducted research on data centers and believes additional guidelines should be established before considering any data center proposal.

Deborah Strube expressed concerns regarding potential impacts to water resources if a data center were proposed in the County.

Trevor Smith stated that the proposed moratorium is a good first step, but believes additional action is needed.

Tom Hutchins (Yadkin County) stated that artificial intelligence is a concerning issue for the future. He expressed concerns that AI data centers could impact property taxes and local governments. He stated that more than one year may be needed to fully evaluate and establish appropriate regulations.

Nicole Eastman (Yadkin Riverkeeper) discussed concerns regarding the significant amount of water used by data centers and potential impacts to the environment and food chain. She encouraged opposition to data centers.

John Fuller (154 Cherry Hill Road, Mocksville, NC) read an excerpt from the 2019 Davie County Comprehensive Plan regarding future growth and development. He stated that potential data center development should be reviewed by an advisory committee consisting of informed local citizens who could provide recommendations to the Board.

Joseph Crotts stated that he lives approximately one mile from Cherry Hill Farm and expressed support for a moratorium on all data centers. He also raised concerns regarding potential harmful chemicals associated with data centers.

Bryan Taylor (Cherry Hill Road) expressed full support for the proposed moratorium.

Robin Mason expressed concerns regarding the loss of farmland and the disappearance of rural communities due to development. She stated that her way of life is being impacted by zoning and development pressures. She expressed concerns about potential noise, odors, and environmental impacts from a data center and requested that the County create a citizen advisory board and conduct independent studies.

Jeff Plott urged the Board to approve the proposed moratorium.

Jake Ratledge stated that he grew up on the farm adjacent to the proposed data center site and expressed concerns regarding potential impacts to the quality of life in Davie County.

Emma Grace Snow, a rising freshman at Davie County High School, expressed concerns about the future of Davie County and potential environmental impacts associated with data centers.

Carrie Ratledge (Pleasant Acre Drive) stated that she owns property adjacent to the proposed data center site. She thanked the Board for considering a moratorium and requested that zoning regulations be adopted to restrict data centers.

Ken Ludwig (Jerusalem District) stated that he agrees with the concerns expressed by other speakers. He believes data centers would negatively impact the community's lifestyle and requested ordinances that would prohibit AI data centers.

Brad Duffner stated that he previously managed the design and construction of data centers throughout the United States. He discussed the complexity of data center projects and stated that the current electrical grid may not be able to support a data center. He also discussed potential cooling requirements and stated that water usage could range from approximately 500 million to 2 billion gallons.

Cindy Boger requested approval of the moratorium and the creation of a task force to help safeguard the community. She stated that the task force could assist with strengthening ordinances and reviewing regulations related to water use.

Felicia Browell provided written comments to the Clerk for inclusion with the meeting minutes.

Darrell Cox (Pastor, Trinity Baptist Church) expressed concerns regarding potential impacts from a data center, including noise that could interfere with church services. He stated that relocating the church due to such impacts would be difficult because of the number of members and attendees.

Sarah Weschler (112 Elon Avenue) requested an unbiased presentation regarding data centers and stated that she would prefer a three-year moratorium to allow additional time for research. She expressed disagreement with creating a task force, citing the existing Comprehensive Plan through 2040. She stated that data centers do not protect natural landscapes, enhance Davie County, preserve natural resources, or contribute to an outstanding quality of life.

Chris Burger (Will Boone Road) stated that he moved to Davie County because of the farming community and requested that the Commissioners listen to residents who do not support data centers in the County.

Rebecca Burger (Will Boone Road) stated that protecting the environment is essential for

survival and requested a permanent ban on data centers in Davie County.

Mary Jamis requested that specific environmental impacts and opportunities for public engagement be included in any future moratorium discussions. She encouraged residents to participate in any advisory council that may be created.

Marsha Correll (Cherry Hill Road) expressed support for the proposed moratorium.

Andy Cagle spoke in opposition to the moratorium. He stated that the property in question is zoned residential and expressed his belief that a data center would not be an appropriate use under that zoning designation.

Chair Finney thanked everyone for their research and everyone who came out tonight.

Commissioner Jones made a motion to close the public comment section of the public hearing. Commissioner Poindexter seconded the motion. All were in favor, and the motion passed 5-0 (Mark Jones, Benita Finney, Richard Poindexter, Terry Renegar, M Brent Shoaf)

Commissioner Jones stated that a 600-acre industrial park should not be proposed. He stated that 100 data centers in North Carolina are either being proposed or developed right now. Commissioners asked questions regarding the proposed timeline, the definition of a data center, the current zoning ordinance, and the process by which commercial developers communicate with County staff.

Ed Vogler stated that all authority comes from the State of NC, and they passed a law, Chapter 106 D of the NCGS law, which provides that local governments may implement a temporary moratorium. Authority is given to extend a moratorium if it meets the requirements that are stated in the law. We can only have a moratorium for a reasonable time period, which is a year, according to looking at other countys. Once the year is close to being up, if the findings are made, we can extend it.

Commissioner Jones made a motion to strike the second sentence of section 1, item 2, (The Davie County Board of Commissioners (Board) shall be permitted to terminate this moratorium early upon the passage of a resolution by a majority vote of the board). Commissioner Shoaf seconded the motion. The Chair announced there was a motion to adopt the one-year moratorium on the development of Data Centers in Davie County, minus the second sentence. All were in favor, and the motion passed 5-0 (Mark Jones, Benita Finney, Richard Poindexter, Terry Renegar, M Brent Shoaf).

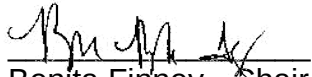

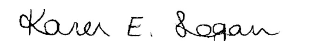

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County Manager's Report

County Commissioners

- The County Commissioners held the monthly Commissioners' Board Meeting. During the May 4th meeting Planning Director Johnny Easter presented on subdivision projects in the Lake Myers area, potential subdivision charges, and zoning amendment for a conditional rezoning of the Neil Cornatzer property. Assistant County Manager – CFO Robin presented March financial report, and Public Utility Director Johnny Lambert update the commissioners on the Sewer AIA.
- The County Commissioners held the May Work Session on May 21st. During the Work Session various reports were presented to the County Commissioners. This included the April Financial Presentation from Assistant County Manager – CFO Robin West, and budget presentations from Dr. Belcher (Davie County Schools), and President Johnny Varner (Davidson-Davie Community College). Finally, Public Director Johnny Easter gave a presentation discussing the need to update the Zoning Table of Uses.

Cooperative Extension

- **Extension Hosts Summer Intern:** N.C. Cooperative Extension, Davie County Center, is one of 47 County Extension offices in the state selected to host interns for the NC State Extension 2026 Summer Internship Program. The program received a record setting number of 274 applications from college students representing 44 institutions across the country. The internship program exposes students to the challenges and awards of community engagement work and helps them consider careers in agriculture, food systems, nutrition, youth development, family and consumer sciences, natural resources and environmental science. Cayleigh Shaw from Mocksville, a former Davie 4-Her and FFA member, is serving as this year's Davie Extension intern. She is a rising sophomore at NC State University studying Livestock and Poultry Management. Cayleigh will work with Davie

Extension staff through July 30 assisting with 4-H Summer Fun programming, shadowing agents, and developing marketing materials and educational activities.

- **Cooleemee Heritage Day:** The Davie Livestock Agent worked with an area dairy farmer to teach Cooleemee Elementary first grade students about dairy farming. Students fed hay to a dairy cow and learned about how differently cattle digest food. The Cooleemee Historical Association sponsors this event for first graders to learn what life was like in the 1930s in the mill town.
- **Pesticide Disposal Day:** The Davie Extension Center in partnership with NCDA&CS hosted a free pesticide collection for homeowners and farmers at the Davie Center on May 6. The collection event resulted in the proper disposal of 135 pesticide containers totaling 1,516 pounds of material. By removing these products from homes and farms, the program reduced potential environmental hazards and helped avoid an estimated \$7,600 in disposal costs. Participants expressed appreciation for the opportunity to safely dispose of hazardous materials that are otherwise difficult for homeowners, landscapers and farmers to manage.
- **Volunteer Appreciation & 4-H Achievement Night:** On May 14, Extension volunteers, 4-H'ers and their families gathered at the Davie Senior Center to recognize the incredible contributions and accomplishments of our volunteers and youth throughout 2025. Cherry Hill Farm was recognized as the 2025 Extension Contributor of the Year, and Marissa Brzescinski as the 2025 Extension Volunteer of the Year. Karen Martin with the Davie County Public Library received the Friend of 4-H Award. Several 4-H youths also received awards for 2025. Levi Williams was recognized the 4-H Volunteer of the Year Award, and Nadilyn Einloth as the 4-Her of the Year. Alex Ortiz received the 'I Dare You' Award, while Leah Frick received the Head and Heart Award.
